

San Francisco Call, Volume 83, Number 16, 16 December 1897 — ADOLPH KUTNER CAN NOW VISIT POLAND [article]



It will be remembered that Mr. Kutner last May applied to the State Department for the necessary papers to enable him to visit his relatives in Russian Poland. The Charge d'Affa res of the Russian legation refused to vise his passport on the ground that he was a Jew, and therefore under Russian law was excluded from the privilege of visiting the country. Senator Perkins and Representative Castle agitated the subject in the Senate and House of Representatives during the extraordinary session by bill and resolution.

After considerable correspondence between the State Department the Russian Government on the subject the Rusian authorities have finally concluded to make an exception in favor of Mr. Kutner without modifying its law excluding Jews from the country. The Russian Minister states that the authorities are satisfied that Mr. Kutner will not become a charge upon the Russian Government should he visit his friends in Poland, and therefore permission is granted him to make a visit not extending beyond one month. While this concession may be acceptable to Mr. Kutner, Senator Perkins will urge some legislation to meet cases of a similar nature.

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
