Societies of City Celebrate the Day When Poland Became Limited Monarchy.

The Polish societies of San Francisco jointly celebrated the 123d anniversary of the constitution of Polish of May 3, 1791, at Turn Verein Hall yesterday afternoon. Nearly 1000 patriotic sons attended the exercises in observance of their country's freedom.

the day when Poland was made a limited monarchy, the mitigation of serfdom and the beginning of its complete abolition. The exercises yesterday brought out an unusually large attendance.

A musical selection was given by Synkow Jrysiak and his four sons. Miss Josefa Zagrowska, Franciszek Woresch, J. Stojeba and G. Robaczewski gave declamations. Speeches were made by K.
