





Lachowce, miasteczko, pow. ostrogeki, gm. L., o 17 w. od Jampola, o 40 od Ostroga, nad Horyniem, par. Jampol, okr. polic. lachowiecki (obejmujegminy: L., Siemionów, Uniów, Pererosłów, Płużnów), kaplice katol., młyny, stawy rybne, piec wapienny. Była tu parafia

katol. dek. ostrogskiego z kaplicami w Załużu, Szunkach, Mikłaszach i Semenowie. W 1441 r. posiadał tę wś Denysko Mokosiejewicz za przywilejem Kazimierza w. ks. litew. Później L. miała posiadać królowa Bona, a około 1520 r. Daszko Kalenikowicz, którego córka wyszła za Jaška Sieniute w 1538 r. Zygmunt I, załatwiając spór o Lachowce pomiędzy Jarmolińskiemi i Sieniutami, przysądził je ostatnim. 1583 r. Stefan Batory nadał miastu prawo magdeburskie i inne przywileje. W 1617 r. stał pod L. obozem królewicz Władysław. Sieniutowie utrzymywali tu kalwinów, ale Paweł Krzysztof Sieniuta, przeszedłszy na katolicyzm, wyrugował ich stad i w 1612 założył kościół dominikanów, do którego, stawszy się potem aryaninem, sprowadził nauczycieli tego wyznania, z kolei wyrugowanych 1644 r. dekretem trybunalskim. Do 1794 r. należały L. do pow. krzemienieckiego, od tego roku do nowo sformowanego pow. ostrogskiego zostały wcielone. Za panowania Jana III, przez zajazd, L. dostały się ks. Jabłonowskim. Z tych jeden Dobrogost usypal na Horyniu groble i wyspe, na której zbudował drewniany zamek, a Józef Aleksander ks. Jabłonowski wojew. nowogrodzki, wymurował około 1745 r. zamek w kształcie pieciokata. Przed 30 laty w prawem skrzydle była już urządzona gorzelnia, wołownia, browar. Kościoła z klasztorem ks. franciszkanów już i śladu nie było, a reszta budynków powoli przechodziła w ruinę. Samo mezko zabudowane na równinie a ku zachodowi rozpoczyna się pasmo wyniosłych gór; jeszcze dotąd egzystują wały oddzielające mezko od przedmieść Leoneina i Staryki. Kościół w 1866 r. odebrany i obrócony na cerkiew, a parafia została rozdzielona: jedna cześć do Kuniowa, druga do Teofilpola, a trzecia do Jampola; był tu jeszcze i trzeci kościół, ku zachodowi na górze, przy drodze wiodącej do wei Wielkich Kaletyniec. Obecnie w L. jest 6 cerkwi. W 1768 r. byli i to hajdamacy ukraińscy; gubernator lachowiecki, o tem donosząc, prosił o przysłanie wojska na obrone. Mko niewielkie, błotne, z obszernym rynkiem, na którym liczne jarmarki co roku się odbywają, a najznakomitszy jarmark w dzień śś. apostołów Piotra i Pawła. Jest tu synagoga żydowska, szkółka parafialna dla wiejskich dzieci, zarząd gminy i sąd gminny. Żydów obojej płci liczy się do 2000, chrześcian do 800 głów; stan wiejski zamożny, gleba czarnoziem drugiej klasy, pszenna. W mku L. urodził się znany pedagog Teodozy Sierociński. Księżniczka Teofila Jabłonowska, wyszedłszy za ks. Lwa Sapiehe, wniosła te majetność w dom meża. Gdy ks. Sapieżyna za granica w 1852 r. życie skończyła, majętność lachowiecka została skonfiskowaną a w 1872 r. L. darowane

generałowi Gallerowi. O L. obszernie w "Starożytnej Polsce" Balińskiego i Lipińskiego, jako też w "Kłosach" (tom XV, 45, 55) artykuł Steckiego. Do klucza lachowieckiego należały wsie: Żemielińce, Suszowce, Mikłasze, Tychomel i Czołhuzów (to w ostatnich czasach: a w dawniejszych): Hulowce, Książęcin, Bisowka Wielka, Semenów, Daniłówka, Denysówka, Turówka, Berezyńce, Wodyczki, Kaletyńce Wielkie, Kaletyńce Małe, Choroszów. Kurjanki, Jurówka, Szymkowce, Dzwonki, Okniny, Kaszczyńce, Unijów, Żyznikowce, Siwki, Szunki i Warywodki. Te wszystkie wioski ks. Teofila Sapieżyna jedne sprzedała z wolnej reki a inne wyszły z jej posiadania przez kolokacyą. Z. Róż.

The former Polish town of Lachowce (Polish spelling) or Ляхівці (Ukrainian spelling) had its name changed in 1949, as a result of post-war border changes, to the Ukrainian name of Білогір'я (pronounced Bilohoria). The town is now located in Ukraine.

The present-day *Ukrainian* pronunciation of the town is: Bilohiria.

#### PAWLICKI, Ladislaw:

Practicing physician, San Francisco, Cal.; b. of Catholic parents December 26, 1831, in Volhynia, ancient province of Poland, now a Russian possession. Ed. first at the Convent School of the Dominican Fathers of Lubar, then at the High Government School (Gymnasium) of the city of Zitomir. In 1851 entered the Medical Department of the Imperial University of Saint Vladimir in Kiev, from which institution, having been graduated in 1855, he was appointed Assistant Surgeon, with the rank of Captain in the Imperial Russian Navy. Ordered to report at the Naval Hospital of Sebastopol, then besieged by the combined forces of France, England, Turkey, and Sardinia. After tue Crimean War he was employed professionally at the hospitals of Nikolayev and Sebastopol, or as acting Surgeon on board men-of-war cruising along the western shore of the Caucasus. ARRIVAL OF STILL ANOTHER RUSSIAN WAR STEAMER.—The heavy and long continued firing, heard in town on Saturday, was owing to the arrival of the Russian steam corvette Rynda, which entered our harbor about ten o'clock in the morning. She is last from Hakodadi, which port she left thirty days ago. On coming up the Golden Gate, she saluted Fort Alcatraz and the Federal war vessels Lancaster and Narragansett, which compliments were duly acknowledged. For a half hour or more the cannonade was spirited. The Rynda has once before visited this port. She is of 800 tons burthen and carries 11 guns. Her complement of men is 160. The list of officers is as follows; Captain, Basarguire; First Lieutenant, Polisnsky; Second Lieutenants—Bourachock, Shickmanoff, Olneick, Leman, Klopotoff; Masters—Boutierkin, Dourkin; Engineers—Archipoff, Sokoloff; Surgeon—Paulitsky. The Rynda is the fifth Russian man-of-war which has arrived here during the last few weeks. Her companions are all up at Mare Island.

#### THE POLISH REVOLUTION.

EDITORS ALTA: In the last Wednesday's number of the Evening Bulletin, its New York correspondent, "J. W. S.," speaking of the actual position of the Southern rebeldom, indulges himself in making reference to the last Polish revolution in the following terms: "In short, the rebellion is not a popular revolution. It is the creation of the slaveholding aristocracy, and does not command the hearty support of the people. It is a bogus revolution, like the recent outbreak in Russian Poland, where the Polish nobility sought, in the sacred name of freedom, to obtain power only that they might adjust around the people's neck a yoke far heavier and more burdensome than that imposed by the Czar. The latter insurrection failed; for it was not founded in justice, and so, at an early day, and for a similar reason, must the attempt to establish a new government upon the corner stone of human slavery," etc.

The reading of such calumny upon one of the most sacred struggles a nation ever sustained against its oppressors, produces painful impressions upon every noble mind, and every Polander's heart fills with indignation. The Polish revolution is bogus! I would have no objection against the correspondent's personal opinion in the matter, but when he tries, through the columns of a leading paper, to mislead the public mind, and put in false light facts too well known, and duly appreciated by all intelligent men, it is my duty, as a Pole, to protest by my present writing against such a falsity, and give him severe admonition not to interfere with matters which he understands perhaps less than I do, in reference to the inhabitants of the moon. Having no proofs, I do not want to imply any relation between the Bulletin's correspondent and the Russian Government, which is notorious for employing spies and literary men to promote its interests in for-eign countries; I am rather inclined to take such absurdities on account of the correspondent's complete ignorance of the facts that I intend now to explain.

The last Polish revolution was not a deed of any person whatever, or of the Polish nobility only, as the correspondent states, but was necessitated by the suffocating and insupportable foreign rule, which overwhelm equally all classes of Polish society, checking all breathings of national life. To suppose that the unrefined Polish peasant felt less, or did not feel at all, the iron yoke of the Russian Government, and did not want to over-throw it, is not to know his true sentiments, nor understand Polish history of latter days, nor the dramatic scenes of the last struggle. It is true that the leading men of the revolution were not peasants, but it could not be otherwise, on account of the low state of the peasant's mental culture, caused by too long servitude. That part, of course, must have fallen on a class of Polish society more intelligent, more capable to oppose such a formidable foe; and that class comprised mostly the inhabitants of the towns and cities, i. e., merchants, tradesmen, mechanics, and the lower nobility. Moreover, the first deed upon the outbreak of the revolution was the long expected decree of complete emancipa-tion of the peasants, (22d of January, 1863,) issued by the Polish National Government, previous to that granted by the Czar, Alexander II., (1864.)

Now, let me ask, where Mr. "J. W. S." sees the intention of the Polish nobility, in the sacred name of freedom, to obtain power only for the purpose of adjusting around the people's neck a yoke far heavier and bur-densome than that imposed by the Czar? Though it is a great problem for me to understand how a citizen of this free country can embrace the cause of Czarism, but as it is a matter of individual taste, I would feel rather reconciled with it, if, at the same time, the correspondent would not blame and stigmatize, with the name of bogus, the very same principles for which the fathers of this Republic so intrepidly fought. Our Polish revolution failed, that is true, not because it was not grounded in justice, not because it was not popular, but because bereft of all material support—our gallantry, courage and sacrifice could not stand against the crushing power of colossal robbers banded together. A favorable time will come, however; we entertain the strongest hope, that the people, tortured and decimated as they are now, will rise once more to accomplish, not anything bogus, but the independence and freedom of their country.



Of the many other benefits given for the Sisters during this period of growth there is one that merits special mention. The Sisters' faithful physician, Dr. L. Pawlicki, a native of Poland and a veteran of the Crimean War, used his influence to secure the services of Madame Helena Modjeska, who was making a tour of America at the time. Early in 1883 a benefit was given by this noble, tender-hearted woman for the Sisters and their little children. A matinee, held at the Grand Opera House, on Mission Street, near Third, on Washington's Birthday, was a grand financial success as well as quite a social event.

We read that later, on August 8, 1883, Madame Modjeska visited St. Francis Day Home. The children's songs of welcome and the following address, by one of their number, bespoke the pleasure that the day gave them:

# KING JOHN SOBIESKI.

The Celebration of Mis Victory Over the Turks.

The Polish population of San Francisco is not very large, but those who are here make up in patriotism what they lack in numbers. In 1683, Poland's warriors, under command of the great King, John Sobieski, raised the siege of Vienna and routed the Turks with great slaughter at Choczim, and virtually saved the Christian world from the invasion of the infidels. Sobieski crowned the Poles with an abundance of the laurel wreaths of victory, and in this city, yesterday, and in every free city in the world, the descendants of the Polish patriots celebrated his grand success. The anniversary of the event was commemorated in St. Mary's cathedral early in the morning by a high mass, and for the first time in the history of the city a Polish sermon was preached from the pulpit by Rev. Dr. Schultz. After the services various religious hymns were sung, the first being the anthem, "Boze cos Polske." The anthem is a prayer to God for the deliverance of Poland and a supplication that the country may again take its place among the nations of the earth. In Russian-Poland the singing of this hymn is strictly prohibited, and even the newspapers are forbidden to mention the anniversary celebration or publish Sobieski's name. In Milwaukee and Chicago, where the Poles are very numerous, the anniversary is celebrated with great pomp and ceremony. At the establishment of Muzio & Krynski, No. 2925 Mission street, last evening, a banquet was given, which was presided over by the venerable patriot Dr. Pawlicki. An elegant menu was provided, and speeches were made in English and Polish by the participants. A letter was received from Mrs. Somolinski of Chicago, inclosing a portrait and the well wishes of the sender. The dining-room was tastefully decorated, and a very pleasant evening was passed. Among those present were Messrs. Bednawski, Piasechi, Malowanski, Hirshfelder, Vidaver, Levison, Czarnechi, Paudler, Ditrich, Lesson, Horain, Fiefielman, Kos-malski, Krynski, Kopankiewski, Popper, Nowachi, Swoboda, and many others.

#### Polish Celebration.







Practicing physician, San Francisco, Cal.; b. of Catholic parents December 26, 1831, in Volhynia, ancient province of Poland, now a Russian possession. Ed. first at the Convent School of the Dominican Fathers of Lubar, then at the High Government School (Gymnasium) of the city of Zitomir. In 1851 entered the Medical Department of the Imperial University of Saint Vladimir in Kiev, from which institution, having been graduated in 1855, he was appointed Assistant Surgeon, with the rank of Captain in the Imperial Rus-

sian Navy. Ordered to report at the Naval Hospital of Sebastopol, then besieged by the combined forces of France, England, Turkey, and Sardinia. After tue Crimean War he was employed professionally at the hospitals of Nikolayev and Sebastopol, or as acting Surgeon on board men-of-war cruising along the western shore of the Caucasus. Ordered (1859) to Baltic Sea Fleet; appointed (1861) Acting Surgeon, with the rank of Major, on board the man of war Rynda belonging to the Squadron of Admiral Popoff, then starting for a three years' cruise around the world. This gave him the opportunity of visiting the principal ports of Germany, Denmark, England, France, Spain, Canary Islands, Cape of Good Hope, Batavia, China, Japan, Okhotsk Sea, Alaska, Hawaiian Islands, and San Francisco, In 1864, settled in San Francisco, and married a Catholic, Ellen Durkin. Dr. Pawlicki was one of the original founders of the California Academy of Medicine, more than thirty years ago. 

As he prepared to leave for action in France, [Francis] Fronczak speculated about his future in private correspondence with friends and colleagues. In a letter to Dr. Ladislaus Pawlicki in San Francisco, he broke the news: You will be interested to know that I have been appointed a member of the Polish Committee in Paris . . . and at a very early day will cross the Atlantic and run the gauntlet of the U-boats in fulfillment of my appointment. Were it not for the conditions in Russia, I should have gone to Paris by way of San Francisco and Japan, and incidentally visited you, all of which would have been a great pleasure to me, and which I regret very, very much I cannot do. I do not know how long I will be on the Western Front in France, nor can I give you any further details at the present time.

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

# Veteran Physician of Bay Region Dead at 92

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 18.—Dr. Ladislas Pawlicki, 92 years old, a resident of San Francisco for 59 years, and until ten years ago actively engaged in the practice of medicine and surgery in this city, died in Mary's Help hospital. His home was at 2396 Pacific avenue.

Dr. Pawlicki, a veteran of the Crimean war, was a surgeon on the Russian ship Rynda when he first saw San Francisco in 1862. Two years later, when the Rynda was ordered home, he left the service and made his home in San Francisco. He married here in 1870 and is survived by two sons. Dr. C. F. Pawlicki and T. E. Pawlicki, an attorney, both of this city.

Two years ago, on celebrating his ninetieth birth anniversary, he gave as his recipe for long life, "work as hard as you wish, as many hours a day as you wish, provided your heart is in your work, and be moderate in all things."

Dr. Poth was the son of attorney James L. Poth of Pittsburgh, who was the son of Ellen (Nellie) Lenahan and James Poth, also of Pittsburgh. Ellen was the sister of John T. Lenahan IV and the aunt of Marisita Lenahan O'Connell.

Dr. Roche was an active member of the Eire Society of Boston. Lenahan O'Connell is a past president.

The roots of the Lenahan family in Ireland go back to the early 1800s to John T. Lenahan I and his unknown wife and to Patrick O'Donnell and his unknown wife. The records are incomplete because so many of them were lost in fires and floods, raids and evictions, famines and civil wars — the unhappy legacy of Ireland's history.

It is known that John T. Lenahan II and Mary O'Donnell produced Patrick Lenahan, who later followed his mother to New York and Florida. He then went north before the Civil War to live initially with a cousin, Anthony Brady. Patrick married Margaret Durkin, and they had two children, John T. Lenahan IV and Mary Lenahan.

When Margaret Durkin Lenahan died, Patrick married Elizabeth Duffy, and there were 11 additional children. However, the blood of Margaret and her brothers and sisters still flowed in John T. IV and his sister, Mary.

They passed it on to their total of 12 children as well as their descendants to this day. As a result, the Durkins must also be considered — at least cursorily — in any history of the O'Connell family.

As best can be determined, the family of Margaret Durkin came to America about 1840 from the village of Ballina, parish of Megownough, County Mayo. Margaret's brothers and sisters were: Edward, Patrick, John, Ellen, and Catherine. Unfortunately, John died of pneumonia in 1839 — just a year before he completed his studies at Maynooth College in preparation for his entry into the priesthood.

When the Durkins arrived in Pennsylvania after landing at Philadelphia, they were well educated and obtained good positions. Margaret married Patrick Lenahan, another Mayoman, and they became the parents of John T. Lenahan IV and Mary Lenahan. As related earlier, Margaret died after the birth of her second child.

Catherine Durkin married John Fleming of Port Griffith, and they had one son — after which time they became lost to this history.

After Patrick Lenahan married Elizabeth Duffy, Edward and Patrick Durkin took their sister to San Francisco, where they placed her in a comfortable convent school for young ladies. Then the brothers went off to the gold fields to try their luck. They returned within several years

with a modest sum of money, retrieved Ellen from the convent school, and then set up housekeeping together.

Edward and Patrick obtained fine positions with the Federal government in San Francisco because they were excellent scholars and were very clever with the writing pen. Their handwriting was like that seen on copper plates.

Reportedly, Ellen Durkin was a great beauty, highly educated, and an accomplished pianist, linguist, conversationalist, and art lover. She married Dr. Ladislaus Pawlicki, who had been trained as a physician in Warsaw and a surgeon in Vienna. They made their home in San Francisco. He was reputed to be a Polish count, who had fled his homeland after an abortive uprising in the 1840s against the Russians.

The Pawlickis had two sons, Thaddeus, who trained to be a lawyer, and Casimir, a doctor. Both practiced in San Francisco well into the 20th century. Since neither married, their line of the Durkin family expired as did Edward Durkin's when he died a bachelor.

Patrick Durkin married <u>Ellen</u> (whose last name remains unknown), and they also lived in San Francisco. They had six children: John, James, Edward, Joseph, Mary, and Caroline. This branch of the family burgeoned and blossomed with the marriage of John to Margaret O'Brien; Joseph to Helen Stamont; and Caroline to Christopher Oughim.

John and Margaret became the parents of Raymond, James, Gertrude, Harold, J. Rutherford, and Helen Durkin. Raymond married Muriel Nichols. Their son wed Mary Hager, and they had five children when last heard from in Pacifica, California.

James married Matilda (last name unknown), and their daughter, Bernice, married Arthur Johnson. Gertrude wed Leonard Giberton, and they had a son, David. Harold and J. Rutherford died as bachelors.

Helen Durkin married Francis Collins and produced three daughters: Lois, Dolores, and Marilyn. When Francis died, Helen became the wife of Charles Benham, by whom she had a fourth daughter, Dorothy.

Lois Collins married Christopher Mullarkey, and they had five children: Shawna, Craig, Neil, Kevin, and Ryan. They lived in Seattle.

Dolores wed Lawrence Fenton, and they had six children: Ellen (wed to James Cornwall), Noreen, Michael, Kerry, Marianne, and Laura. The family lived in Petaluma, California.

Marilyn wed David Byrnes, and they had ten children: Karen, Jamie (wed to Paul Shultz), Kevin, Michael, Kean, Timothy, Brian, Sean, Maura, and Bridget. (David Byrnes, Jr. died in infancy.) The family lived in Montrose, California. David, the father, died of a heart attack while in Denver on business.

Meanwhile, Joseph and Helen had five children: Jamie Joseph, Denise, Joan, Chris, and William. Their marriages and progeny are unknown at this time. All were living in northern California communities.

Caroline and Christopher Oughim had three children: Margaret, John, and Gertrude. Margaret married Harold Joseph and had three children. They were living in Belmont, California. John married, but his wife's name is not known. He resides in Santa Rosa, California. Gertrude died at an early age.

Elizabeth Duffy's parents — Bernard and Mary McDonald Duffy — were the parents of seven children: James, Bernard Jr., John, Lawrence, Ann, Margaret, and Elizabeth. The records indicate that Elizabeth's sisters and brothers all died before they could consider marriage. Bernard died in 1861 and Mary in 1867. As recorded, Patrick Lenahan died in 1898 and Elizabeth lived on until 1910.

Today, probably many of the fourth and fifth generation descendants of James and Elizabeth O'Connell and Patrick Lenahan and his two wives — Margaret Durkin and Elizabeth Duffy — have little knowledge of the harsh history of their Irish-born antecedents. Undoubtedly, many of them do not even think of themselves as ethnics — if they consider their lineage at all.

In their minds, they are Americans, who have been here for years they cannot tally. After all, it may be argued, was not assimilation into the American Dream the ultimate goal?

Pawlicki Władysław (1831-1923), lekarz, działacz polonijny w Stanach Zjednoczonych. Ur. 26 XII w Lachowcach w pow. ostrogskim na Wołyniu. O rodzicach brak wiadomości. Jego wuj ks. Koźmiński wystał go w r. 1846 do gimnazjum w Żytomierzu. Następnie P. studiował medycynę na uniwersytecie w Kijowie. W pierwszym roku studiów utrzymywał się z korepetycji, przez następne lata był na «skarbowym koszcie, zobowiązany za to po ukończeniu medycyny do podjęcia pracy w charakterze lekarza Floty Czarnomorskiej (1855). Przebywał w Sewastopolu przez ostatnie 3 miesiące oblężenia, później pracował tam w szpitalu morskim. W r. 1858 objął stanowisko lekarza na pokładzje okrętu wojennego patrolującego wybrzeża Kaukazu. Zimą 1859 został przeniesiony do Floty Bałtyckiej. Początkowo pracował w szpitalu w Kronsztadzie, potem był w eskadrze admirała G. I. Butakowa, Jesienią 1861 należał do eskadry admirala A. A. Popowa, odbywającej podróż dookola świata. W San Francisco P. dowiedział się o wybuchu powstania styczniowego. Na wieść o tajnym rozkazie szybkiego wypłynięcia eskadry i powrotu do Rosji opuścił okręt, zawiadomiwszy o tym listownie dowódcę. Obawiając się wydania przez Amerykanów władzom rosyjskim, ukrywał się przez parę miesięcy w górach, korzystając z pomocy osiadlego w Kalifornii Polaka. Poczatkowo jego sytuacja była bardzo trudna z powodu nieznajomości języka i miejscowych stosunków, po kilku jednak latach zdobył w San Francisco pozycję jako lekarz, praktykując głównie w środowisku irlandzkim i miejsco-

wej kolonii rosyjskiej.

P. był członkiem Tow. Polaków w Kalifornii (kontynuującego działalność powołanego w r. 1863 Komitetu Polskiego w San Francisco) i w końcu lat siedemdziesiątych oraz w latach osiemdziesiątych - jego wiceprezesem, a następnie prezesem. W r. 1880 przystąpił do powstałego właśnie Związku Narodowego Polskiego (ZNP), od początku propagując jego idee. Został wybrany na delegata na I Sejm Związku we wrześniu 1880 w Chicago, ale ze względów rodzinnych nie wział w nim udziału. Jednak niewątpliwie pod wpływem P-ego Tow. Polaków w Kalifornii przyłączyło się wkrótce do ZNP, najpierw jako grupa nr 4, a następnie jako grupa nr 7. P. utrzymywał bliskie stosunki z Heleną Modrzejewską, która podarowała Towarzystwu bibliotekę. Współpracował ściśle z Muzeum w Raperswilu, zabiegając dla niego w Kalifornii o pomoc finansową. Od r. 1894 był członkiem korespondentem Tow. Muzeum Narodowego Polskiego w Raperswilu, był też współpracownikiem Muzeum Polskiego w Chicago. Propagował sprawę polską na gruncie amerykańskim, urządzając obchody rocznie narodowych, publikując w prasie kalifornijskiej artykuly, np. na temat jubileuszu J. I. Kraszewskiego. Na Wystawie Międzynarodowej w r. 1894 w San Francisco zorganizował 20 V w Festival Hall Dzień Polski z udziałem Modrzejewskiej. Dn. 3 V 1899 w San Francisco na uroczystym obchodzie rocznicy Konstytucji 3 maja wygłosił odczyt na temat stosunków wewnętrznych w Polsce w okresie Sejmu Czteroletniego. Rozwijał różnorodne akcje, aby zaznajomić opinię amerykańską z uciskiem stosowanym wobec ludności polskiej w zaborach pruskim i rosyjskim, m. in. przygotowywal w tej sprawie memoriał na Kongres Katolicki w Chicago we wrześniu 1893. Nie doszło jednak

do postawienia tej sprawy wskutek oporu

zmartwychwstańców.

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P. był także aktywnym działaczem katolickim. Próbował różnymi sposobami przeciwstawić się zabiegom Kościoła prawosławnego, zmierzającym do nawrócenia unitów-emigrantów z Galicji na terenie Stanów Zjednoczonych. Publikował w tej sprawie artykuły w pismach The Catholic American News" i "Monitor", wywierał też wpływ na redakcję "The Catholic World". Wspólnie z Modestem Maryańskim opracował "Statystykę Kościoła Polskiego w Stanach Zjednoczonych" (Kr. 1892, jako autor: Maryański) na Wystawę Lwowską w r. 1894 na podstawie informacji udzielonych przez proboszczów parafii polskich w Ameryce, jako odpowiedzi na ankietę rozesłaną przez P-ego i Maryańskiego. W sporze między ZNP i Zjednoczeniem Polskim Rzymsko-Katolickim P. wystapił po stronie ZNP, krytykując działania zmartwychwstańców. Powoływał się przy tym na pozytywne wzory współpracy między organizacjami religijnymi i narodowymi wśród innych grup etnicznych w Stanach Zjednoczonych, a zwłaszcza irlandzkiej. Dążąc do zjednoczenia podzielonego wychodźstwa polskiego w Ameryce, opracował wspólnie z Maryańskim projekt utworzenia Ligi Polskiej, która powstała w r. 1894. Jednak wobec silnej opozycji uznał, że projektodawcy nie powinni wchodzić do jej zarządu. Liga istniala do r. 1896. O ostatnich latach życia P-ego brak wiadomości. P. zmarł 10 XII 1923 w San Francisco i tu pochowany został na cmentarzu Św. Krzyża.

Pawlik Michał (Pavlyk Mychajlo), pseud. Rusin, krypt. M. K., M. T., P. K. (1853-1915), pisarz, publicysta, socjalistyczny działacz ukraiński w Galicji. Ur. 17 IX w rodzinie chłopskiej we wsi Manastersko (Monastersko) pod Kosowem. Uczył się w gimnazjum w Kołomyi i we Lwowie, gdzie w r. 1874 zdal maturę i rozpoczął studia na Wydziale Filozoficznym Uniw. Lwow. Początkowo związany był z moskalofilami i należał do stowarzyszenia «Akademickie Kólko» (Akademičnyj Kružok), a od r. 1876 wchodził do jego zarządu. Zaprzyjaźniony z Iwanem Franką, wspólnie z nim redagował od r. 1876 pismo "Druh" (1874-7), które z moskalofilskiego przekształcili w niezależny organ o charakterze demokratycznym, lansujący idee związku ukraińskiej inteligencji z ludem wiejskim i publikujący artykuly o treści socjalistycznej. W tym czasie znalazł się w kręgu ludzi związanych z Michailem Drahomanowem; dwudziestoletnia przyjaźń, ścisła współpraca, stała korespondencja wpłynęły na ukształtowanie polityczno-spolecznych poglądów P-a. W styczniu 1877 P. został aresztowany we Lwowie wraz z grupą młodych działaczy ukraińskich, pod zarzutem propagandy idei socjalistycznych, związków z zagranicznymi nielegalnymi organizacjami i współpracy z Drahomanowem; w procesie 16-20 III 1877 skazano go na 8 dni aresztu. Ponownie aresztowany został w końcu 1877 r. w związku ze sprawą Erazma Kobylańskiego przybyłego z Petersburga do Lwowa dla nawiązania stosunków z socjalistami polskimi i ukraińskimi. Sądzony we Lwowie w procesie polskich i ukraińskich socjalistów 14-21 I 1878, P. otrzymał wraz z Kobylańskim najwyższy wyrok trzech miesięcy więzienia (20 VIII - 19 XI 1878) za przynależność do tajnej socjalistycznej organizacji i działalność propagandową. Aresztowania te spowodowały upadek "Druha". Od 1 IV 1878 P. i Franko wydawali we Lwowie nowe demokratyczne pismo ukraińskie "Hromadskyj Druh", a następnie pisma zbiorowe "Dzvin" oraz "Molot", w których drukowali m. in. artykuly Bolesława Limanowskiego.

Od czasu procesu styczniowego 1878 r. P. (podobnie jak Franko) włączył się do pracy w galicyjskim ruchu robotniczym i związał z polskimi socjalistami, głównie dzięki pomocy Bolesława Limanowskiego. W sierpniu 1878 wszedł do grona wspólpracowników "Pracy", w której od tego czasu zamieścił wiele artykulów. Myślał



In July, Madame **Monique Gauche-Pstrokonski**, granddaughter of Josephine Junosza, artist who painted the church painting, came to Chabreloche in the footsteps of her grandmother and **her father, Stanislas Pstrokonski**, whose burial is at the **cemetery of Chabreloche**. A wine reception was organized by the town hall. Documents on Ms. Junosza have been discovered, including a photo taken at the Louvre Museum, where she is seen copying a painting when she was 85 years old.

The church of Chabreloche has recently housed a beautiful painting, a mastered and freshly restored copy of a work by Titian, exhibited in the Louvre.

It was hidden in the shadows and served as a partition under the staircase leading to the bell tower. Here it is now brought to light on one of the walls of the Chabreloche church. In front of an attentive audience gathered for the inauguration, the **city councilor Mireille Carton** told last week the beautiful story of the painting **The Transport of Christ to the tomb**.

Let's be clear right away: this is a copy. The original, signed Le Titien, is in the Louvre, in the same room as La Joconde. But the copy is very well made ?? thanks in particular to quality catering.

Let us return to the staircase which leads to the bell tower. "It was a friend, Agnès Dupuy, a painting restorer in Ambert, who noticed it," says Mireille Carton. She offered to restore it. We discussed it with **Mayor Christian Genest** and we came to an agreement. This would enhance our little church, which dates only from the second half of the XIX th century and where there is little furniture. "

The financing of the project was completed thanks to private donations and the benefits of concerts given by pianist Laurent Martin.

The artist painter owned a house in Celles Agnès Dupuy took charge of the restoration of the canvas and the frame. She discovered that the painting was signed J. Junosza. J like Joséphine. Mireille Carton led the investigation: "We found that this woman **painter had had a house built in Les Hommades, in Celles-sur-Durolle.** It is still called "**la maison de la Génosa**" even if it was sold in the 1950s."

The research carried out by the two women revealed that **Joséphine de Junosza**, **born in Warsaw**, was known to have made copies of paintings at the Louvre museum at the beginning of the last century. **Her son Stanislas lived in Chabreloche**, in the former gendarmerie. **"He was in charge of the cinema**, he painted and it was he who **made the sets for the amateur theater troupe"**, specifies Mireille Carton.

If the chosen one, passionate about art, found a certain amount of information on the painter, she could not solve the mystery of the painting. How did he end up in the church? Was it an order? Has it been offered?

Other questions concern the frame, which has also been restored. It is a Mouth, a renowned signature in the art world. There again, the link with Chabreloche emerged thanks to the investigation of Mireille Carton and Agnès Dupuy.

"Émile Bouche, son of the painter Georges Bouche and Émilie Charmy, owners of a house in Marnat, had set up an annex of his frame manufacturing company in Chabreloche at the time of the Second World War". Did Bouche and la Génosa know each other? Certainly. But how did they come to work together on Transporting Christ to the Tomb? "It's a real police investigation", laughs Mireille Carton, still awaiting testimonies that can help her clarify the last gray areas.

#### One year of work

The restoration of the painting, (of which here is a detail) took a year of work from Ambertoise Agnès Dupuy. There were notably repaints on the canvas, which had to be removed, and some pieces of the frame were peeling off. Today, even if it is clearer than the original, the copy has regained all its brilliance.
