Perfect harmony prevailed throughout the meeting, and about ten o'clock the party separated in high spirits.


LETTER FROM GENERAL HOWARD.
 Major Wm. G. Morris read the following from Major-General O. O. Howard, in answer to a request to address the meeting:
 OCCIDENTAL HOTEL,
 SAN FRANCISCO, September 12th, 1876.
 Col. Alex. G. Hawes, President Veteran Guard—DEAR COLONEL: I thank you for your flattering invitation just received, and would be very glad to accept it, but must leave the city to-morrow morning.
 I notice that your Colonel, E. S. Salomon, is the same officer who once commanded a regiment, and afterward a brigade, in my corps during the war. General Krzyzanowski also was a brigade commander in the same corps. They were brave and able soldiers in war time, and I believe will make very efficient leaders in the present campaign. I shall trust them to speak true German for me, at the presentation of the flag to the regiment.
 It is surely very proper for me most heartily to commend that cause for which your Veterans fought in the war, that it may be maintained with constancy in time of peace. With sincere regret that I cannot accept your courtesy, I remain, truly yours,

Włodzimierz Krzyżanowski, Polish engineer, politician, and military leader; fought in the American Civil War; a Brigadier General in the Union Army; his saloons in San Francisco went bankrupt; Piotrowski was among his creditors. **Korwin Piotrowski loaned Krzyżanowski \$1,000 for the latter's saloon ventures** -- The New York Casino and The Louver; Korwin Piotrowski **lost his investment** in Krzyżanowski's ventures when Krzyżanowski declared bankruptcy (inferred from his letter dated 10 April 1878 to Helena Modjeska)

Polish Society of California, 1878

General Krzyranowski then moved that a Committee be appointed by the President to draft resolutions showing their feeling in the matter, and that a copy be sent to the President of the United States, and to the Chairman of the Committee on Foreign Relations of the Senate. The motion was unanimously carried, and the following gentlemen were appointed: U. Bielawski, O. Choynski, A. Elgass, O. Lessen, and General Krzyranowski.

The Secretary of the Society, A. Elgass, then read extracts from different Polish papers in regard to murders committed by Russians.

The Committee was ordered to report at the next meeting, and the meeting adjourned until Friday, the 19th inst.

TESTIFY IN BEHALF OF MISS NIGHTINGALE

Doctors Say Mrs. Krzyzanowski Introduced Trained Nurse as Her Daughter.

The trial of the contest of the will of Palagia Krzyzanowski, a Polish woman who died in this city last January leaving an estate worth \$30,000 to Charles Rickman, a friend, was commenced before a jury in Judge Troutt's court yesterday. A decision in favor of the nephew and niece of Palagia Maria Kryzanowski, in their contest of that eccentric woman's will, was rendered yesterday by Judge Kerrigan, who has had the case under advisement for several weeks. The winners are Aloyzy Sylvester Borkowski, who lives somewhere in Poland, and his sister, Antonina Borkowski Ogonowska of Schenectady, N. Y. The losers are Attorney George H. Perry, to whom the interest of Charles Rickman, the deceased beneficiary under the will, was assigned, and Rickman's two sons, who would have shared in the residue after Perry had taken out his 25 per cent.

The court was satisfied with the proof of relationship of the niece and nephew and judged from the evidence that Madame Krzyanowski was incompetent to make a will, when she signed the testament leaving nearly all of her \$30,000 estate to Charles Rickman, a pickle peddler. When the will was made, the woman was in a hospital, suffering from a paralytic stroke. She died less than a month later.

Of the original \$30,000 only about \$11,000 remains and there is another obstacle in the way of its distribution to the niece and nephew. The Rickman interests hold an assignment of the rights of Marie Nightingale in the estate and now that the will has been broken, will try to prove that she is the daughter of the deceased and her heir at law. Under this claim of relationship Marie Nightingale filed a contest against the will before it was admitted to probate in February, 1903. The case was tried in Judge Troutt's court, but before it was submitted to the jury the alleged daughter accepted \$10,000 as a compromise and assigned her interest to Rickman. Perry received \$1000 for his fees and other allowances were made which reduced the estate to its present proportions.

Witnesses in the trial of the case testified that Madame Kryzanowski claimed to belong to the nobility of Poland. She was married three times and her third husband was a general in the civil war in this country. In her latter days she lived in squalor, in spite of her fortune.

He claimed that the withdrawal of all money from the funds of the estate had been entirely irregular and charged that an effort was being made to dissipate the funds to forestall the claims of his client. He said the coming petition would embody these charges.

ROMANTIC CAREER.

Mrs. Krzyzanowski had a most romantic history, according to De Golia. She was born in Polish Russia and claimed to have been of noble birth. Her first husband was a Russian officer, who was arrested for conspiracy against the Government, and was shot while trying to escape. Her second husband was a dissolute Russian officer, who dissipated most of his wife's fortune and then killed himself. She traveled over Europe with her two children, both of whom died in Paris. In the early eighties she came to San Francisco. Here she was married to General Krzyzanowski, who had commanded a brigade in the Civil War, and was then engaged in running a combination saloon and cigar store on Montgomery street. They went to New York for their honeymoon and eight days after the

marriage the third husband shot himself in a New York hotel.

After this event the decedent returned to this city and occupied a flat at Seventeenth and Mission streets, over a grocery store. She lived a retired and quiet life, having no friends except Rickman, who became a roomer in her flat. She was parsimonious and no one suspected that she was possessed of means, although it is stated that she sometimes displayed diamonds and jewelry to the value of several thousand dollars.

When she was stricken with her fatal illness she at first went to the County Hospital. There it was learned she was possessed of money and her friends had her removed to St. Joseph's Home, where she died.

Before she died Rickman secured the services of Attorney Perry to draw up a will of the property of the dying woman in his favor. The will was signed at the deathbed and Perry and Henry W. Gantner of the then undertaking firm of Gantner & Guntz were the witnesses. To the sisters at the hospital the woman on her deathbed declared she had no living childer

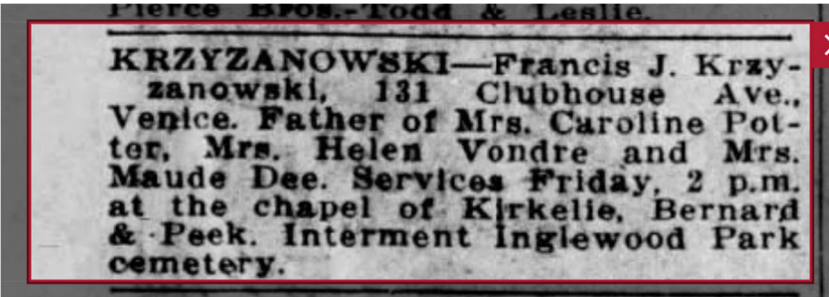

If Congress moves promptly, there may yet be time for the nation to observe July 9 as "Gen. Krzyzanowski Memorial Day." A resolution introduced last week by Rep. Thomas J. Lane, D-Mass., calls on President Kennedy to proclaim the day in honor of the general.

Most Americans never heard of Wladimir B. Krzyzanowski. Presumably that's why Rep. Lane introduced his resolution.

Krzyzanowski, an immigrant from Poland, was among the first to volunteer to defend the Union at the outbreak of the Civil War. Krzyzanowski rose in rank from private to brigadier

rank by President Lincoln. He fought in the battles of Bull Run, Cross Keys and Gettysburg, making a distinguished record for courage and leadership. Civil War Historian Bruce Catton has said of him, "Krzyzanowski is as good an American name as Cabot."

Americans, although descendants of immigrants, sometimes lose sight of their heritage and draw unfounded distinctions because a name may not "sound" American. "Gen. Krzyzanowski Memorial Day" would do honor to Wladimir B. Krzyzanowski and all the other Americans with foreign sounding names who contributed to the nation's
