STRAFORD, October 21.—Travel through central and northern England, making one night's stand, gives one an excellent opportunity to study that daily English institution, the village inn. Descendant of a family of millers. Orphaned at age 8. His father was a baker. Stanisław visited Berlin, Dresden, and Leipzig. He started his first business in Weisbaden. He then went to Frankfurt and Paris. In 1871 he set up business in Brussels. About 1872 he arrived in San Francisco and shortly thereafter visited France. He worked in the hairdressing business in San Francisco with **John Doherty** from 1873 to 1874, eventually opening his own place in 1875. He was the first to introduce wax figures in San Francisco. He was a noted linguist, having mastered at least 6 languages. He went to France every few years on business and also visited Poland while in Europe. He loved Persian cats. He never married.

A POLISH CELEBRATION.

Two Hundredth Anniversary of Sobieski's Success.

Yesterday was the two hundredth anniversary of the rescue of Vienna and defeat of the Turks by the Poles, which marked the last efforts of the Ottomans to extend their dominion in Europe. In every village in the United States where any number of Polish citizens dwell, as well as in Europe, some sort of celebration yesterday commemorated the delivery of the Poles. Here there are but a few Polish citizens, but the day was celebrated at St. Mary's Cathedral by a High Mass, Rev. Father Cottle officiating, and by an address by Rev. Mr. Schultz, a Polish priest sojourning temporarily in this city. His subject was "The Wars of King John III of Poland" (Sobieski) and included a brilliant eulogy of the patriot King. The address was delivered in Polish. It was the first Polish address ever delivered in a church in this city. There is no Polish congregation here. After mass three Polish religious hymns were sung by the congregation, the first being the national religious anthem, "Boze cos Polske." All joined heartily in the singing. In Russian Poland singing of the "Boze cos Polske" has been prohibited for many years, and many a Pole has been sent to Siberia a martyr to his patriotism for singing this sacred hymn. Father Schultz has been only a few months in America. He is from Posen, Prussian Poland. He was obliged to leave his diocese on account of the May laws of 1875-76 of the German Parliament. Though the expatriated priest has fared well in this country, he desires to return to his diocese, and hopes shortly to be able to do so, as some liberal amendments to the May laws are being considered.

A prominent Polish citizen yesterday said that half a million Poles had come to America during the last ten years, a majority of them from Prussia. In Chicago there are nearly 30,000 Poles; in Milwaukee nearly as many. There are three Polish churches in each place, and in each place yesterday a public celebration of a grand character marked the anniversary of Sobieski's success. Governor Hamilton and Count Rozenta participated in the Chicago celebration, the latter being Chief Aid to the Grand Marshal. In Milwaukee there was a grand historical procession, showing in allegory the prominent events of Polish history from 850 to the revolution of 1831. One of the characters represented was J. G. Kraszewski, the litterateur and editor recently imprisoned but subsequently released on 30,000 marks bail. He was accused of no crime, but his residence has since his release been guarded by the police. He is regarded as one of the greatest Polish writers and thinkers.

The celebration in this city was continued last evening, the Polish Society holding a grand reception at their headquarters on Mission street and others, not members of the society, celebrating the event at the rooms of Stanislaus Strozynski, under the Baldwin Hotel, where extensive preparations had been made for the event. A large table, laden with sumptuous viands and choice wines, in the center of which was a large floral emblem bearing the words "John Sobieski, 1683-1883, September 12th" occupied a prominent place in the reception-room and other attractive features were everywhere discernible. During the progress of the evening several speeches were made on Poland, its past and future, by J. Degorski, Roman Strozynski and Stanislaus Strozynski, all of which were delivered in Polish.

200th Anniversary of Sobieski's Success

He became prominent in the Polish Society and delivered an address in his native tongue that is still remembered with interest by those who heard it, on the 200th anniversary of Sobieski's siege of Vienna and defeat of the Turks. He was the friend of his countrywoman, Modjeska. Among his patrons were the Crockers, the Tevises, Mrs. Jane Stanford, Mrs. Benjamin Harrison, the Baroness de Tocqueville, Annie Louise Cary, the Popes, the Talbots, the Snarons, the Hagers, Princess Poniatowski, and so on down the Blue Book line.

Stanisław Stróżyński was prominent in the **Polish Society of California**. His speech at the 200th anniversary celebration of Sobieski's siege of Vienna was memorable. He was a friend of **Helena Modjeska [Modrzejewska]**.

Strozynski was charitable to the tips of his fingers. To many a poor, struggling wreck of humanity he lent a helping hand. He was patriotic beyond the measure of the ordinary man. In 1883, when the 200th anniversary of the siege of Vienna by the Poles under the great Sobieski was celebrated by those of Polish nationality all over the country, Strozynski kept open house and entertained most lavishly in honor of the event.

Theophile Strozynski Charged With Having Two Wives.

The trial of the case of Constance Goffin vs. Theophile Strozynski, to recover \$171.05 yesterday before Justice of the Peace Reimer, developed proof of a clear case of bigamy.

The complaint simply stated that the plaintiff had loaned \$67.25 to the defendant, and that the rest of the money was due her as wages for keeping his house four months.

Constance Goffin, the plaintiff, a poorly dressed Frenchwoman, of middle age, and unable to speak English, was called to testify.

"Were you ever married to this defendant?" asked her attorney.

"Yes; in Santa Rosa, on the 20th of September, 1888. I have my marriage license with me."

"Were you ever separated from him legally?"

"No."

"Then why do you call yourself Goffin, while his name is Strozynski?"

"Goffin is my maiden name!" exclaimed the witness, rising in her chair and forgetting to address herself to the interpreter, and I took it because Strozynski betrayed me. I had lived with him but a few weeks when a friend of mine told me he had another wife living, and that I was only a wife in name. I left him then and brought suit for my money."

This declaration caused a sensation in the Courtroom and nearly dumfounded the valiant Edward S. Salomon, who represented Strozynski.

The plaintiff's attorney then produced the marriage certificate of Strozynski, showing that he was married to a woman named Sanger. The attorney said he could prove she was not dead or legally separated from the defendant.

A cross-examination by Salomon failed to shake the woman in her direct testimony, although it brought out a few additional facts.

"Where did the defendant meet you?" asked the warlike Salomon in a loud tone.

"In Petaluma; I was head landress in the Washington Hotel at a salary of \$25 a month."

"And yet you ask for \$25 a month as housekeeper for my client, and the work was much easier?"

"It was. But I would rather have \$25 a month and be happy over my work than \$1000 and live with a brute like that."

"Were you ever married before you met Strozynski?"

"Yes."

"To whom?"

"Boulanger."

"Not the French General?" gasped Salomon.

"Oh, no. He was a common, ordinary working man, and died soon after I married him."

Strozynski, the defendant, was then put upon the stand. He is a veteran of the late war, and now on account of blindness and partial deafness is living off a pension recently granted him by the Government. His present home is on Mission street, near Twenty-second. He made a general denial of Mrs. Goffin's statements. He had married her because he thought his first wife was dead, and when he found out she was not they had separated.

Justice Reimer took the matter under advisement because of the conflicting statements of the parties. It is stated that criminal proceedings for bigamy will at once be commenced against Strozynski. Conrad Kissler and other neighbors of the defendant were present in Court yesterday, prepared to prove, if necessary, the fact of Strozynski's bigamy.

Edward S. Salomon represented Theo Strozynski... Theo was married to a woman named Sanger... Theo was a veteran of the late [civil] war... blind and partially deaf... lived on Mission Street near 22nd Street... thought his first wife was dead so lived with French-speaking Constance Goffin...

A VETERAN'S CRUEL TREATMENT.

Assaulted by a Sturdy Neighbor and Sent to the County Jail.

Maurice Strozynski, a small-sized and enfeebled veteran of the civil war, was tried in Police Court No. 1 yesterday on a charge of vulgar language preferred by a stalwart man named Michael Bogue. Strozynski and Bogue are both residents of Bernal Heights and neighbors. The testimony showed that they recently had a quarrel over Bogue's alleged trespass on Strozynski's property and Bogue assaulted his neighbor, knocking the old veteran down and cutting him about the head and face. It was then that the infirm veteran used the vulgar language charged. Judge Rix found Strozynski guilty of the charge and fined him \$10. As the poor old veteran has neither friends nor ready money, he could not pay the fine and was sent to the County Jail to serve ten days' imprisonment. His burly assailant was much elated.

A HUSBAND'S GREETING.

Theophile Strozynski Accused of Throwing Vitriol at His Wife.

Although aged and almost blind, Theophile Strozynski is locked up on a charge of having thrown vitriol on his wife. He was arrested yesterday morning at his home by Detective Price on a warrant sworn out by his wife Constance. The couple have been married only a few months and have lived very unhappily. They quarreled frequently and bitterly. Several weeks ago Mrs. Strozynski was taken sick and she went to the hospital because she could not receive proper treatment at home. Upon leaving the hospital she went to live with friends instead of returning to her husband. She went to her home last Monday morning to get some clothing, and when her husband opened the door he greeted her by throwing a cup of some liquid at her. It did not strike her face, but wherever it struck her clothing they were burned. The clothes were given to an analyst and he reported yesterday that the fluid used was vitriol. Mrs. Strozynski then swore out the warrant for her husband's arrest. He denies having thrown any vitriol at his wife and says that she is maliciously prosecuting him.

A Blind Bigamist.

Theophile **Strozynski**, a Grand Army veteran with an unsavory record, was arraigned yesterday morning in the Superior Court for bigamy, and pleaded not guilty. **Strozynski** is blind, but it is alleged that he won the hearts of May Jackson and Constance Goffin and led them both to the altar within a year of each other, without being legally separated from the first one wedded.

Troubles Between a Weak-Eyed Veteran and His Spouse.

STROZYNSKI AGAIN ARRESTED.

She Says He Had a Wife Living When He Married Her—He Claims To Be the Victim of Conspiracy.

acquitted of a charge of throwing vitriol on one of his wives

"This is a foul conspiracy to get possession of my property. I am a poor old man, almost blind, and have never injured anyone." Thus spoke Theophil Strozynski as he was led into the City Prison yesterday afternoon by Detective Price and charged with felony, "to wit: bigamy." The warrant for his arrest was sworn out by his wife Constance. In her sworn complaint she sets forth that he married her at Santa Rosa on September 20, 1888, and that he was "then and there the lawful husband of one Mary Jackson, and had said Mary Jackson for his lawful wife, who was then alive, as he then and there well knew." During their seven months of married life the couple have lived anything but happily, and it is only a week ago since the wife had her husband arrested on a charge of throwing vitriol over her clothing. When Strozynski was examined in Police Court No. 2 last Monday the allegation was proved to be so unfounded that Judge Lawler promptly dismissed the charge.

While seated on a bench in the corridor of the City Prison awaiting his release on bonds, Strozynski positively refused to be interviewed by reporters until gently interrogated by a representative of the ALTA. Then he told a story that would place the actions of his wife in a very peculiar light, if true, and showed that he considers there is some foundation for his allegations that he is the victim of a conspiracy. "Yes," he said, "it is true that I married my wife Constance at Santa Rosa seven months ago. I am almost blind, and married her for a helpmate through life. At that time she was a divorced woman, and her name was Gaffin. She is French, aged about forty-five years, and I am a Pole, and on the shady side of fifty. Our nationalities and ages, however, have little to do with our troubles. We had been married only a few weeks when I discovered the great mistake. She was not a true and devoted wife, and when I took her to my little home on Bernal Heights, she soon made my life almost unendurable. In addition to leaving me alone at all hours of the day and night, I soon discovered that she was acting dishonestly toward me. One night last January I went to bed and left my pants lying on a trunk. When I awoke I found that \$30 in gold had been taken from the pockets. The pockets were all slashed and torn out, to make me think that I had been robbed. The next day I accused my wife of having stolen the money, and she denied it. Several days later, however, she acknowledged having taken the money, and declared she had lost it. A nice wife for a blind man! She would not even sew on a button for me.

"Well, things went on from bad to worse, until she took me to the office of a French lawyer. I forgot to mention that we had only been married three weeks when she began to neglect me and threaten to get a divorce. At the lawyer's office my wife jabbered away in French, which I could not understand. I asked for an explanation, and she said she was drawing up papers for a divorce. Having become tired and sick of her conduct, I consented to a divorce and did not suspect that she was scheming to get hold of half my property. Before the arrangements for the divorce were completed my wife became sick, and I sent her to the French Hospital. It was on Monday afternoon, April 8th, that I returned home and found her carrying off everything in the house with a wash-basket. She kept going back and forth from the house, carrying away a loaded basket on each trip. Before leaving the last time she said: 'Good bye forever.' I asked her where she was going and she said, 'Down the Mission road.' She returned to the house on the following Thursday and warned me that I would see what would happen 'by and by.' Then Officer Price came along and I was arrested on the trumped up charge of felony for the alleged vitriol throwing.

"No, I did not commit bigamy. I was a widower when I married Constance, as my first wife died in this city in 1881."

Strozynski has engaged an attorney, who says that if Strozynski's first wife is still living he was made to believe that she was dead. Strozynski is a Grand Army man, having fought throughout the war of the Rebellion in the Thirty-first New York Regiment. Exposure on the battlefield caused him to lose his eyesight and become enfeebled in other ways. For this he is receiving a pension of \$50 a month.

A BLIND BIGAMIST.

A SIGHTLESS ENOCH ARDEN'S MARRIAGES.

Theophile Strozynski Thought His First Wife Dead, and Therefore Married Again.

Theophile Strozynski, the old, blind soldier, who figured as the hero of an Enoch Arden romance and got into trouble thereby, was acquitted of any criminal intent by a jury in Judge Van Reynegom's court yesterday evening. The jury was out but a few minutes.

Strozynski served with distinction through the war, and afterward became blind. Before this, however, he married Mary Jackson and came to California with her from one of the Eastern States. He became blind some time after his marriage. He came to this city and made an uncertain living for himself and wife by doing odd jobs. A couple of years ago he wandered away from home, and in Sonoma county wooed and won Constance Gaffin, a widow with a little landed interest. He had been informed, he said, that his first wife had died, and last fall he made Constance his wife. She analyzed her feeling for him as being that of pity and admiration for his sterling qualities as a warrior.

In the courtroom yesterday the two wives sat side by side and were evidently good friends. Neither of them is young. Strozynski is 60 years old. The testimony showed that he had unquestionably married both women, but the jury presumably believed his defense, that he thought the first wife dead, and promptly acquitted him. Neither of the wives was pleased with the result, and Mary, the first, talks of divorce proceedings. That would leave Strozynski without any wife at all.

An earlier news article states that he married Mary Jackson in San Francisco; one Civil War record states he was dishonorably discharged

"This case will be tried next Friday," said the Court.

"Oh, dear, how long to wait!" cried the petite wife.

"It's a shameful delay," assented the plump wife.

As the sightless veteran was led from the room he muttered: "Friday for trial; I don't like that. I married both of them on a Friday. I think that's my unlucky day, for sure."

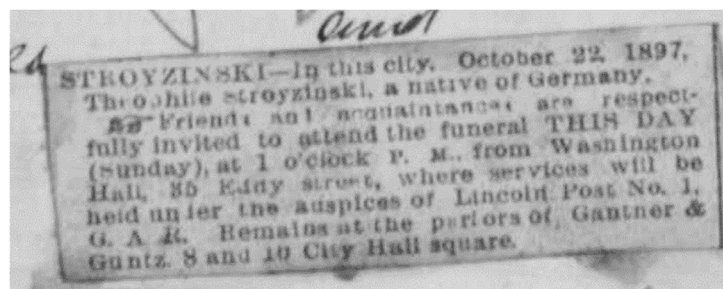

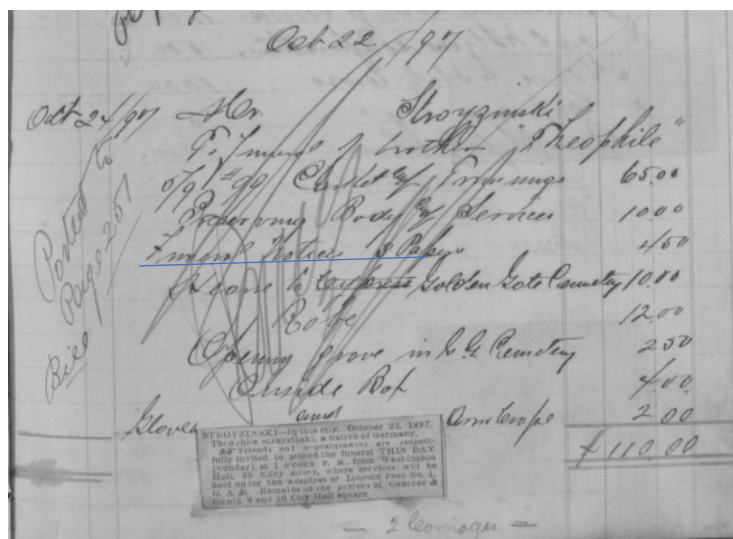

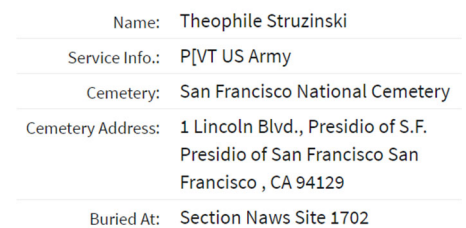

Preparations for hair dutiable as alcoholic.

Before the U. S. General Appraisers at New York, October 11, 1897.

In the matter of the protest, 33927b-4072, of **S. Strozynski**, against the decision of the collector of customs at San Francisco as to the rate and amount of duties chargeable on certain merchandise, imported per railroad and entered August 13, 1897.

Opinion by WILKINSON, General Appraiser.

The merchandise consists of Broux Mixture, Eau Broux, and other hair dyes containing alcohol. They were assessed for duty at 60 cents per pound and 45 per cent ad valorem, under paragraph 2, act of 1897, and are claimed to be dutiable under paragraph 70 of the same act.

Under the act of 1894 the Board held that applications for the hair were dutiable under the provision for toilet preparations, and not under that for alcoholic compounds and perfumery. This view, on appeal by the Government, was sustained by the circuit court for the district of Massachusetts.

But conditions are very materially changed by the new act. The pertinent provisions of the tariff of 1897 are as follows:

"Par. 70. Preparations used as applications to the hair * * * *not containing alcohol or in the manufacture of which alcohol is not used.*" * * *

"Par. 2. All alcoholic perfumery, including cologne water and other *toilet preparations of all kinds, containing alcohol or in the preparation of which alcohol is used.*" * * *

The new provisions, which we have italicized, effectually dispose of the question raised by the protest.

We find that the goods are toilet preparations containing alcohol.

The assessment of duty is affirmed accordingly.

RIVAL HAIRDRESSERS.**Strozynski and Schwarze at War in the Courts.**

S. Strozynski has sued **Hermann Schwarze** to recover \$510 damages for malicious prosecution. The parties to the suit conduct rival hairdressing establishments. Recently Schwarze commenced a suit against **Strozynski** for an infraction. In his complaint he spoke of the work done by **Strozynski** as "manifestly inferior, inartistic, unsatisfactory and bucolic."

Strozynski now complains that, by reason of these allegations and the publicity given them in the newspapers, he has been deprived of many customers. He shows that after he had answered the complaint, Schwarze dismissed the case without a trial. **Strozynski** accuses the defendant of trading on his reputation. Schwarze, he says, was until January 1st last, in his employ as a "subordinate barber and haircutter." The allegations made by Schwarze, under oath, are declared by the plaintiff to have been false, malicious and slanderous.

Stanislaus Strozynski, who for years conducted a hair dressing establishment at 24 Geary street, died yesterday morning at his home, 404 Ellis street. The deceased was perhaps the best known man in his business in the city, and during his many years of toil he accumulated a fortune. Shortly after his death an order was made allowing the inspection of his papers, and among them his will was found.

By the terms of the will a small fortune is distributed among his employes. He said that he recognized the fact that his success was largely due to the efforts of his help, and in appreciation of the good and faithful work of his oldest employe, whom he called "Lulu," he bequeathed her one-half of his business and \$1500. POLES IN LEAGUE AGAINST RUSSIA

Local Societies Form Union---
Will Raise Funds to Help
Their Countrymen.

Between 150 and 200 Polish residents of San Francisco, in mass meeting yesterday afternoon at Tiv Hall, 143 Alhambra street, formed a league whose purpose will be to aid in a financial way the alignment of Poland with Austria, in anticipation of what they say is an inevitable conflict between Austria and Russia. Thirty-two dollars was subscribed yesterday toward the Polish fund, and members of the league promised to add to it at the rate of from 10 cents to \$10 apiece each month.

Speakers yesterday recounted the history of the Polish people. Poland was a cultured country long before civilization invaded Prussia or Russia, they said, and was the first country in Europe to adopt a constitution. Notwithstanding early advances, Russia tyrannized the Poles, compelling them to abandon their own language and their own schools. So acute has this oppression become, they said, that it is necessary that Poland take steps to win back its rights.

Throughout yesterday's meeting Austria's attitude was eulogized. Austria, which governs Galicia, a part of Poland, has allowed the Polish people every freedom. Universities have been established, and the lot of the Pole in Austria is far different from that of the Pole in either Germany or Russia.

There are 1500 Poles in San Francisco, it was brought out yesterday. These are banded together in three societies, the largest of which is the Polish Society of California, Branch No. 7. In the United States are nearly 5,000,000 Poles. These are preparing to form one large league, which will contribute to the fund by which Poland hopes to regain recognition as a country.

F. Sturzelbeck presided at the mass meeting. Speakers were as follows: Mrs. Felicia Romanowska, the Polish prima donna; S. Maliszewski, a veteran of the Polish revolution of 1833; J. of Gaymanski, R. Fromaniewicz, W. Jozewicz, P. Gruszczynski and others.

Announcement was made of a celebration of the adoption of the Polish constitution in 1794, to be held on May 18th, at Golden Gate Commandery Hall, Sutter street, between Steiner and Pierce. There will be special music and several prominent speakers, including Mayor Rolph and Professor George R. Noyes of the department of Slavonic languages, University of California.

Don Rising

I have still not discovered how all my Polish relatives in California are connected. I don't know of **Sawicki**. My grandmother **Bronisława (Bessie) Dombrowska**, who went by Bessie, had two brothers and a sister, **Maria Dombrowska who married Karl Staugus**. The brothers **Joseph and Aleksander Dombrowski** came to the SF area about 1901. In 1910 Joe was living at the Hull Dairy Farm in San Carlos, CA, and working there as a laborer. **Alexander Dombrowski married Frances Oszwyc** in St. Boniface in 1906. Joseph Dombrowski was in the April 1910 census and was listed as married for 5 years, and was 31 years of age [**neighbor of William Sawicki**]. The Hull farm was on the border of Belmont and San Carlos, and its owner was later a mayor of San Carlos. Also working at the farm was a person with a name that may have been Vincent Kolnicky, perhaps a cousin to Frances **Oszwyc**, as her mother's name was Wincentia Kolnicky (Kolnicka), according to Alex Dombrowsky's wedding record. Wincent and Frances were witnesses to the Staugus wedding as well. Alex and Joe left for Michigan sometime after 1910 and Joe eventually returned to Poland or Lithuania and died there. My grandmother, Bessie, arrived with her family in 1926 and settled near the Staugus family. We are related to **Caroline Noreiko**, sometimes spelled **Norayko**, who married Stanley **Chesnak**, and **Adolph John Noreiko** her brother who married Stanley's sister Elizabeth **Chesnak**, and the Chesnak's mother's maiden name was Martha **Kasper**. Those are most of the Polish names I know of folks we may be related to.
