A meeting of British residents was had at the rooms of the British Benevolent Society, No. 531 Galifornia street, yesterday afternoon, Charles Mason, British Vice-Consul, was chosen President, and J. P. M. Ourrie, Secretary. Archie McKinlay was elected Marshal, and Captain George Naunion and Captain James Lennett, Aids, to take command of the representation of British residents in the funeral procession to-morrow.

The Secretary was instructed to attend to the furnishing of fisgs, banners, crape, etc. An assessment of 50 cents was levied.
